



Field Experiment

In the spirit of nurturing creative research, development, and action, Hambidge again joined forces with The Goat Farm Arts Center to proudly present an unconventional public action project in Atlanta. FIELD EXPERIMENT 2016 brought groundbreaking work to the surface with the following support:\$2,000 for each of 5 beta projects, and a winning \$20,000 commission, residency, and collaborative production assistance to realize a prodigious vision for Atlanta. Finalists were chosen from 77 applications received from 32 cities, 16 states, and 4 countries including Thailand, Chile, Canada and Norway.

The winning project was 9to 5 by Pablo Gnecco, Christopher Derek Bruno, and Travis Broyles. The finalists were Contemplation - Resolution - Unity by Martha Whittington & Rae Long; Ghosting Atlanta by Maya Gurantz; Post by T. Lang, Jessica Anderson, Mikhail Jacobs, John Osburn, and Hebru Brantley; Color Slug by Beau Martin & Sam Crane.

Our Art Auction + Field Experiment
Gala was the most successful yet. Our
Honorary Chair, Chef Kevin Rathbun, truly
raised the bar with his outdoor cooking
extravaganza. Our twelve curators
provided an extraordinary selection of
artwork for the silent auction, the installations of our five Field Experiment finalists
were fascinating, and every corner of the
environment created by our co-presenter,
The Goat Farm Arts Center, was astoundingly beautiful and awe-inspiring.

Our Great ARTdoors Festival in October was a gorgeous art & fun filled day with live music, art installations, mule rides, studio visits, great food (featuring BBQ from our own old-fashioned pig roast), craft demonstrations, a canjo workshop and performance, a native plant sale, U-Do-Raku, and several opportunities for environmentally fun education, including snake handling with the Orianne Society, bee-hive building with K&K Enterprises, pollinator puppets with Beech Hollow Wildflower Farm, and dancing & singing plants at the PlantBot ArtLab.





Campus Saturday Series

The Hambidge Center invites the public to its historic campus on almost every Saturday for a series of rotating activities that highlight the historical, creative and environmental components of the center.

First Saturday Gristmill Visits give demonstrations, 1-4pm, of the historical gristmill Mary Hambidge built in 1944 for the use of local farmers.

Second Saturday Artist Talks offer the community a chance to meet the artists-in-residence and to gain insight into the creative process. Beginning at 7pm, each participating resident gives a short reading or presentation.

Third Saturday Nature Hikes are led by knowledgeable guides along the incredibly biodiverse Hambidge hiking trails, meandering through meadows, streams and forests.

Fourth Saturday Special Events include opening receptions at the Weave Shed Gallery, weaving demonstrations and other events announced monthly.

Atlanta Performances

In June 2016, Hambidge curated a sensational series of performances and art installations for the PNC Arts in the Vineyard in midtown Atlanta. Every Tuesday and Thursday of June, 12-1:30pm, visitors ate their lunch while enjoying free music and art in the Atlanta Food & Wine Festival's Vineyard in the City. It was a lovely series of events in a magical place, made all the more special because it was fleeting. The vineyard existed for only a month and construction for a skyscraper began in late summer.

Artists included Rust, Cicada Rhythm, Russell Gunn & The African Drums, the Tony Bryant Blues Band, Ben Sollee, performers from Alliance Theatre, musicians of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, Free Poems on Demand, glo, and installation artists Peter Bahouth, Laura Bell, Rachel Garceau, and Lonnie Holley.

Workshops & Pottery Events

In addition to our two yearly Anagama Kiln firings, we relaunched our workshop program with Tricks, Tips, and Techniques for Creative Knitting with widely published TKGA Master Knitter Charles Gandy, and an Autumn Ceramic Workshop Series, featuring five outstanding Hambidge Fellows, including a Teapot Workshop with Rick Berman; Integrating Form and Surface with Vernon Smith; Transforming the Ordinary: Creating Unique Sculptural Forms in Clay with Sarah White; and Clay and Drawing in the Mountain Landscape with Priscilla Hollingsworth. We look forward to offering more workshops in 2017.

Exhibitions


For the spring show in our Weave Shed Gallery, Hambidge Fellows were invited to explore the term 'lightweight.' Curated by Lisa Alembik, *Lightweight* included work by 26 Fellows and ranged from paintings & drawings, to sculpture & poetry.

Our summer show, Foxfire: Weaving A Visual History, curated by Jessica Helfrecht, was a celebration of Foxfire's 50th anniversary and Hambidge's role in its inception. The exhibition featured folk art and fine craft that embody the spirit of the Foxfire tradition.

In the fall, our *Invitational Show of*Pottery and Handmade Objects, curated by Mary Callan Thomas, presented a superb selection of items by Hambidge Fellows and regional crafts people.

In partnership with Whitspace gallery, we also sponsored a show in Atlanta. Inspired by the landscape of Hambidge, In the Space of Summer was a group show of work by Elizabeth Chiles, Karen Elizabeth Cleveland and Olivia Valentine, who first met and shared ideas during a Hambidge residency.





Environmental Initiatives

In addition to releasing 1000 beneficial beetles to save our Hemlocks from parasites, performing aquatic bio-monitoring to help preserve our ecosystem, and planting 500 milkweed plant to nourish Monarch butterflies, Hambidge continued our ongoing work to restore 54 acres to its original natural glory. Our mitigation bank directly engages with the Army Corps of Engineers, the Environmental Protection Agency, Department of Natural Resources and ecologists in the planning and execution of stream restoration, tree planting and removal of invasive species.

Arts & Culture Trips

Hambidge hosted two uniquely designed trips in 2016. The first was a journey to Cuba in support of our developing Cuba Bridge Fellowship. Highlights of the trip included accommodations in a beautifully renovated convent in Old Havana, and visits to Camaro Oscura, Colon Cemetery, Bellas Artes Museum, El Callejon de Hamel, Habana Compas Dance, and artists' studios.

The second trip was to the Hudson Valley in New York, in support of the Hambidge Site-Responsive Installation Fellowship.

Among the many adventures on this trip were visits to the world-famous Storm King Art Center, the Culinary Institute of America in beautiful Hyde Park, charming and historic Rhinebeck, DIA Beacon, the Bard College campus and Innisfree Garden.









Strategic Plan

In November of this year, the Center's Board of Trustees ratified a formal Prosperity Plan designed specifically to ensure stable growth and mission focus for Hambidge through 2019.

More than a simple strategic exercise, the plan was informed by a almost 12 months of formal internal and external surveys, community focus groups, and Board and Committee planning sessions.

The result is an integrated step-by-step tactical plan to ensure Hambidge's success in three critical areas...

- Preserving and maximizing assets current and planned,
- 2. Acquiring and developing greater "people power" from our Residents, Staff, Board and Partners, and
- 3. Expanding and diversifying income opportunities.

Implementation has already begun and the Board and Staff are excited to be starting 2017 with a clear and actionable mission-driven focus.
